

Orders and payment can be dropped off in the yellow box. Order forms will also be available in the foyer.

NRCS Wetland Reserve

Easement Program (WRE)

The 2023 Application Deadline for the USDA-Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) Wetland Reserve Easement (WRE) Program is 2/17/2023. The WRE program is a voluntary program in which landowners can enter into an agreement with NRCS to restore wetlands on their land. Wetland Reserve Easements provide habitat for fish and wildlife, including threatened and endangered species, improve water quality by filtering sediments and chemicals, reduce flooding, recharge groundwater, protect biological diversity, provide resilience to climate change and provide opportunities for educational, scientific and limited recreational activities. Land eligible for wetland reserve easements includes privately held farmed or converted wetland that can be successfully and cost-effectively restored. NRCS will prioritize applications based the easement's potential for protecting and enhancing habitat for migratory birds and other wildlife. NACD 2023 POSTER CONTEST





JOEL MCROBERTS MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP



The Joel McRoberts Memorial Scholarship was created in 1998 in memory of Joel, who was a District Technician with the Lorain Soil & Water Conservation District for 20 years. Joel died in 1997 of leukemia. The scholarship was created at the request of his widow Connie McRoberts, of Litchfield.

Joel McRoberts was a big supporter of agriculture and higher education. Although he never attended college, he understood the value of education and always encouraged students to further their education and better themselves. Joel was devoted to farming and the farmers in Lorain County. He had a deep appreciation of our natural resources and their protection. This memorial scholarship is administered in his honor.

The scholarship is available to any student in Lorain County who will be majoring in an agriculture or natural resources management related field at any two or four year college. They must have a minimum GPA of 2.5.

With the generosity of the individuals in Lorain County, the scholarship has grown with time, expanding to include two awards annually: one for an incoming college freshman and one for any current college student with at least one year completed. Joel McRoberts Memorial Scholarship:



2023 SEEDLING SALE DESCRIPTIONS

NATIVE WILDFLOWERS

EVERGREENS

Norway Spruce: Excellent tree for wind- Tulip break and wildlife cover. Although not thrives in deep, immune to deer damage, deer generally leave this evergreen alone. This fastgrowing spruce grows best on well- full sun. Quickly drained soils and will tolerate a lot of grows tall and shade. It will retain its dense drooping straight up to 90 branches as the tree matures. Grows to ft. with a 35- to 50 ft.

White Pine: A tall, stately tree with an attractive conical shape and branches nearly to the ground in open stands. Adapts to a variety of sites, but prefers moderately moist, sandy loam soils. Grows to 80-100 ft.

HARDWOOD SPECIES

Shagbark Hickory: Narrow, upright erosion control, regrowth. Height to 90 ft. Fall colors are vellow and golden brown tones. Known for its sweet edible nuts and shredding bark. Nut production should start in 25 to 30 years.

Swamp White Oak: Grows to 70 ft. A fairly fast growing, medium-sized tree that may reach a diameter of 3 ft. The acorns are one of favored fall foods for a spread of 15 to 20 ft. deer, turkey, and many other wildlife species.

Persimmon: A small to medium sized tree whose fruit is valuable to both humans and wildlife. One of the hardest of North American woods. Grows 25 to 40 ft. in height. Male and female flowers are




borne on separate plants, so plant several trees near each other.

Burr Oak: Massive, slow-growing. Adaptable to moist & dry sites. One of the most False Indigo: Found in moist ground along picturesque of the oaks. Grows 70-90 ft. tall with an 80 ft. spread. Produces large acorns (up to 1.5") that are nearly covered by a rough, frilled cap and relished by many species of wildlife.

American Chestnut Hybrid: A fast growing hybrid reaching a height of 80 to 100 ft. Spread 30 to 40 ft. Best planted in full sun in well drained soil. Although both male and female flowers can be produced on the same tree, they need another American Chestnut for good pollination and nut production.

Tulip Poplar: poplar rich, well-drained but moist soil and 50-ft. spread.

Sweet Gum: Large tree with a mature height of 90 ft. and a 60 ft. spread. Does best in deep moist soils. Beautiful orange and red fall colors. Commonly used for windbreaks. forestation. and wetland restoration.



SHRUBS

Cranberry Viburnum: A deciduous shrub, grows 8-12 ft. tall and wide, with white flowers clusters in May. Bright red berries in early September persist through winter. providing necessary food for birds.

Button Bush: Mature size 7 to 12 ft. tall and wide. Definitely a wetland shrub. Thrives in wet, swampy conditions, low lying areas, around bogs and ponds. A pollinator favorite!



streams, rocky banks, and low, wet woods. Flowers are 2 to 6" long with dense clusters of blue-purple flowers. Bees, butterflies and other wildlife are attracted to the flow-

ers.

American Hazelnut: A multi-stemmed shrub/ small tree. Medium-fast growth rate. 10-15 ft. in height with a spread of 10-12 ft. Edible nuts mature September-October.

WILDLIFE FOOD PLOT MIX & GARDEN COVER CROPS

WILDLIFE FOOD PLOT MIX

Create Food Plots for Wildlife! Whitetail 365 is exactly what its name implies. It's a perfect Throw & Go mix for any situation on any farm. It can be planted anytime from early spring through late fall. The combination of oats, rye, and peas ensures that something is always growing and providing forage for deer year-round. It can



be grown on the toughest ground in the toughest conditions. Mix components: A blend of legumes and annual grasses including 2 varieties of peas, annual ryegrass, and oats. 1 Bag (25lbs) Plants 0.5 Acres.

GARDEN COVER CROPS

Garden cover crop seeds: (1 lb packet) - Garden Cover Crop Mixes help to reduce erosion and compaction, and increase water permeation in the garden. They also hold minerals normally leached from your soil over the winter. Densely planted cover crops will suppress perennial and winter annual weed growth. The top growth and roots add organic matter to the garden soil. The cover crop's root system also opens passageways that help improve air and water movement and supports microbial life. This microbial life works synergistically with the roots, bacteria and fungi to improve soil health. Mix contains untreated seeds suitable for organic gardeners, plant in August through October first, with no soil prep. Covers 200 sq. ft., winter kills. These will be available for pick up early to mid August.

Largemouth Bass, Bluegill, Hybrid Bluegill, Channel Catfish, Red ear Shellcracker, Fathead Minnows, Japanese Koi, Triploid White Amur and Yellow Perch are all available.

You will need to bring a container filled with vour pond water to pick up your order. Approximately 5 gallons of water for each 100 fingerling size fish is needed. We suggest using a trash

can with a new, **unscented plastic** ponds that are half an acre or larger. suitable container.

Triploid White Amur are stocked to control leafy pond vegetation. Algae Japanese Koi will eat aquatic vegetais not a preferred food. Since the Amur were first stocked in Ohio in the fall of 1987, you may need to replace your Amur. The life expectancy is in the 10 to 12 year range. Recommended stocking rates for the Amur are 2 to 5, per surface Nature's Pond Conditioner is a onceacre of water, based on how much weed cover is in the pond at its worst point over the summer.

Stocking recommendation Largemouth Bass is 100 and for Bluegill 500 per surface acre of pond area. Yellow Perch and Redear Sunfish (Shellcracker) can be stocked at 100 per surface acre of pond as well.

Channel Catfish can be stocked in
