Unique Characteristics

White fringe tree, also known as Grancy Greybeard, is a lovely multi-stemmed, rounded shrub that can be pruned into a small tree. This species is well suited to urban plantings due to pollution tolerance and adaptability to varied soils; however, fringe tree is not salt tolerant.
